Editorial

The subprime 'crisis' has achieved proportions of a global meltdown. There is enough being said about the issue by everyone knowledgeable and not so knowledgeable about the topic. I would just like to add my three questions to the prevailing confusion:

1. Why are profits allowed to be privatized when losses are expected to be socialized?
2. What were the credit rating agencies doing all this time besides collecting fat fees?
3. Since the government, and ultimately the masses, are being asked to bail out the losses, are we admitting the failure of pure capitalism?

Meanwhile, the world is waiting for the Nano. I was proud of this Indian engineering feat as well, until I uncovered facts about the land acquisition. [It is tragic that the 'free' Indian press has chosen to portray only one side of the story, and our legal eagles, normally over enthusiastic about litigation, have chosen not to tangle with the Tatas.] Reading deep into the issue, through the net and international press reports, several acts by the Tatas in collusion with the Bengal Govt. struck me as being nothing short of draconian. A total of 977 acres has been 'acquired' from 13,000 or so farmers, over 2,500 of them unwilling. A law enacted by the British in 1894, the Land Acquisition Act, was invoked to forcibly take over prime farmland. Have we gone back to the Dark Ages? Even the British used this act only for 'public' projects such as railways. I cannot, in any figment of imagination, consider the private sector Nano to fall into this category.

Look a little deeper: The land in question is not for the Nano itself. It is for ancillary units. The only reason the Tatas are insisting on forcibly acquiring this land is to prevent a marginal cost increase. So a Rs.1 Lakh car will cost Rs.1,05 Lakhs. To avoid this do you stoop to land grabbing? Do you threaten to walk out so that other 'blinkered' states jump in and create political mayhem which clouds the core issue? Does this not remind you about "Wag the Dog"?

Land for the ancillary units is available without any controversy just across the highway from the Nano plant. The landowners are willing to sell. It is barren land; unsuitable for agriculture, ideal for industry. The marginal extra cost of transportation of components should have been borne by Tata or passed on to buyers. For once in my life, I stand with the communists.

Closer to home, there have been a lot of improvements at our alma Mater. New toilets have been set up. An online interactive education system has been test run with jazzy software and LCD displays in classrooms. A new computer lab is also on the cards. Kudos to Fr. Evarist for these forward thinking measures.

Excerpts from "The School Report 2007-08"

The School Report

The year began with an orientation programme on 'Movement Meditation' for the staff conducted by Fr Prashant Olalekar, S.J. He modelled the concept of InterPlay, using free-flowing movement to facilitate a conjunction between the body and the spirit. This helped the staff to stay in tune with themselves and gear up for the academic year with renewed vigour and enthusiasm.

During the course of the year, two groups of teachers from the primary and middle sections attended workshops in English and one group from senior school attended a workshop in Geography as part of in-service training and they bring these new perspectives into the classroom. The Staff excursion to Palas Resort at Palas, Raigad District was a time of bonding and rejuvenation.

The following teachers have left St Mary's: Ms L. Rayan, Ms L. Sen, Mr J. Alvares, Ms A. Chaudhary, Ms P. George and Mr S. Yadav. Ms R. Pental, Mr G. Hilbert and Ms S. Menon joined us on the staff. We also regret the very sudden demise of Mr John D'Souza, who was a great help in matters of maintenance and general assistance in the school, in May this year.

113 students were sent up for the ICSE examinations this year, securing cent per cent results. We are proud of their astounding success, with large numbers in the higher brackets. 32 students secured 90% and above, 38 students secured 80% and above, 37 students secured 70% and above, 05 students secured 60% and above and 01 student secured 50% and above. Rayner Vaz stood first with 95.86%. Prithvi Lalla stood second with 94.86%. There was a tie for the third place between Abhigyan Keshri and Atish Parikh, both scoring 94%. We congratulate all our students and wish them fair winds and following seas. We also thank the teachers who guided them to success. I particularly commend the following students for excelling at the ICSE examinations without having recourse to private tuitions and coaching classes: Abhigyan Keshri, Aditya Anupam and Francisco Luis. All these will merit a special award.

Sports

If you drive in to school early, you'll see the grounds dotted with different camps practicing football, basketball, cricket and roller-skating. In all games, it's the spirit of participation that counts. We participated widely in all events organized by the Mumbai School Sports Association and other such organizations, at inter school level - carrom, chess, table tennis, tennis, squash, cricket, football, basketball, and other tournaments.

This year we secured the 3rd place in the U-12 Football and the 3rd place in Basketball in the tournaments organized by the Mumbai Schools Sports Association. Other achievements are listed in the Sports report. The Arrupe Football Festival Day was a fun-filled exciting day for all our budding footballers. The Annual Sports Day saw us at the Mumbai University Stadium in full school regalia, with the School Band in attendance, the ceremonial march past and the track events. The Chief Guest was Fr Baptist Pinto, S.J., Principal of St Xavier's High School, Fort.

Social Outreach

Our students contributed handsomely to a Jesuit literacy project, headed by Fr Trevor Miranda, for reaching education to the masses: REAP (Reach Education Action Programme). We collected almost 7 lakhs towards literacy programmes, an overwhelming response that we hope will not wane. We continue the twinning with Uplat, near Talasari in Thane District. Our students visited the school there and experienced the rural way of life. The Canteen Days' collection was sent to cover financial expenses of the boarding school. We are happy to note

that the Uplat adivasi school secured cent per cent results at the SSC exams. Over the years, we have made our vast grounds available for the Sports Day for the orthopaedically challenged children from The Society for the Education of Crippled Children. Contributions for social and literacy projects in Shirpur, Ambatha, Akola district, Shilonda (Thane District) Raigad District - all run by the Jesuits- and even faraway

Nagaland were made possible by funds raised through the Interact Club. A generous contribution of gifts of clothes, stationery and toiletries from the preparatory and primary school was sent to orphanages and the needy in the neighbourhood: St Anthony's Home, St Joseph's Foundling Home, Asha Daan and Shilonda in Thane district.

Computers that were being phased out by the school but still in excellent working condition were given to the children of Class IV employees.

We also assisted students of Tata Institute of Social Sciences by providing gifts for their social projects.

6th October was World Hospice and Palliative Care Day organized by the palliative care unit of Tata Memorial Hospital. A member of the team addressed our students on cancer awareness and we participated in the cancer awareness programme by sending our boys of classes 8 and 9 to be part of the human chain formed at Parel.

As in the past, we continue to send our boys to participate in the Terry Fox run.

Curricular and Extra-curricular Activities

At 'We Are the World' conducted by the Rotaract Club of H. R. College, we came first among 32 schools. At the fest 'Euphoria', organized by the alumni of Hiranandani Foundation School, we again secured the first place. For our rendition of a patriotic song at 'Rochak', the Hindi Fest at Christ Church School, we were awarded the second place. We secured the 6th place overall at the Jamnabai 'Cascade' out of 26 schools, and the 3rd place in dramatics there. We also participated in 'Vogue', organized by the Rotaract Club of H. R. College. Some fine voices contested the singing competition organized by the Time and Talents Club.

In the Elementary and Intermediate Exam, we sent up 25 candidates who were all successful.

Dramatics at Mary's is always fraught with interest as four thoroughly professional plays are put up, entirely by the boys. The plays this year ranged from the topical to a gripping psychological murder mystery, and a couple of classics. Extremely well done and very well-received. Arguing often passes for debating and sometimes there's very little difference really. We had some very strongly contested debates this year. And, of course, the Inter House Quiz where it's not just knowledge that's tested but application too.

Teachers' Day had the student council in charge of the forenoon's events. The students regaled us with interesting items efficiently coordinated by themselves. Later on, an enthusiastic young emcee got the crowd of over 300 guests: parents, teachers, retired staff etc to take to the floor for the group games and dancing. I thank the parents for organizing this programme and for their assistance throughout the year.

Children's Day is best seen in these pictures. Games and contests galore with prizes claimed by the dozens. This year we had a roller skating exhibition, a speed and skill display for parents on the basketball court. It was a fine show of talent in our own yard. Lurking in the depths of every boy is a need and ability to express himself in his own peculiar idiom. And so, for the first time, we also had an in-house creative writing competition for students from class 5 to class 10.

Camps, hikes, excursions to villages, hill stations and the plains: the great outdoors is the best place to learn. The scouts had a trip to Karjat, the cubs went to Panchgani, among other places, and the RSP roughed it out at Uplat, a Jesuit concern and our twinning school.

Mr R. A. Rajeev, the Additional Municipal Commissioner, was the chief guest at the annual School Exhibition. The year's work in all classes was displayed for the parents and a couple of neighbouring schools.

The primary section runs with clockwork precision encompassing a plethora of activities: meaningful assemblies, projects, field trips, interesting lessons and activities to build participation and involvement.

At the Festival of Plays, Classes 1 to 4 had plays ranging from a christmas story to ones with definite moral values and a classic, Oliver. Each student of each class was on stage. The focus is on values to be shown, oral communication, team work, combining music and actions with speech, and most importantly learning to collaborate. The boys learn that playing the role assigned to them to the hilt is what is important, not how big a role it is that they have.

The Junior Sports Festival is an exercise in coordination and a fine display of skill and colour. For the flat races, the three best runners of each division are chosen to compete. Class 1 made a mark in the field of cheerleading and also displayed remarkable alertness in carrying foodstuffs without spilling them, their race aptly titled 'Busy Chefs'. Class 2 had a Dandiya display of colours and a caterpillar race, learning to move in tandem: a much needed skill these days! Class 3 had an aerobics display and some fancy wrist-work, dexterously passing balls up and down. The men in uniform could take a leaf out of the Guard of Honour formed by Class 4 with their hockey sticks, which were then used for a drill that epitomized the spirit of India: Chak De India. Lithe and agile, they also formed a pyramid with lightning speed. The message the students carried home is that everyone is a winner.

This concrete jungle that Mumbai is, has still some delights to offer our little boys: excursions to Mazagaon Hill, the fire station, the Prince of Wales museum, various events at the Nehru Science Centre, the convenient Colaba Woods, the Maharashtra Nature Park at Mahim, the Worli Dairy and closer home, the kitchen at the Fathers' residence!

The Preparatory is a little world by itself, tucked away at the top, a perfect introduction to school, where leisure is the word of the day and life is full of exciting possibilities. The Preparatory 'Olympics' is a noteworthy annual feature: our five-year-olds can dive through a hoop, turn somersaults, run relays, navigate through an obstacle course, jump over and under a rope, carefully carry a bowl of water without spilling a drop - a useful accomplishment about the home. The festival culminated in the preps dancing to the Hopscotch Polka and then signing off with The Birdie Dance to which their parents were invited to join in.

At An Afternoon of Music, the preps enjoyed singing and enacting all the songs they'd learnt through the year. They are taught to pitch correctly, a very important skill that includes listening carefully.

All in all, a successful year, with students and staff enjoying the ethos of Mary's and maximising their potential.

A word about new features that have been added this year thanks to the initiative of the alumni. We have seven 'Smart Classes' with interactive electronic devices to bring learning alive and cater to the changing needs of students today. We've all known the thrill of retiring to our favourite corner with a good book and being lost to the world for a few hours. The primary section now has its very own Reading Room with a little loft too, where students can read undisturbed. Display shelves, bright colours, well-chosen books (and that highest selling point, an AC!)... this is the kiln where many a budding writer's imagination should be fired and a place for endless leisure.

The students' toilet has been done up aesthetically and showers have also been placed. Big Brother has, of necessity, made inroads even into Mary's through the CCTVs installed in the corridors, grounds and other public spaces within the school.

We should soon have a counsellor on campus to help us better administer to the mental and emotional health of our students.

I take this opportunity to thank the alumni and some interested parents for taking the initiative to ring in these changes and providing the wherewithal to make them materialize.

As I conclude my address, I express my sincere thanks to all who have contributed to making St Mary's what it is. The teachers, non-teaching staff, support staff have all played an important role in keeping the flag of St Mary's flying high in the city of Mumbai. I thank Ms Marie Martin, the Preparatory and Primary Supervisor, for her unstinting support, her meticulous planning and meetings with teachers to make the

teaching learning exercise effective and Mr Wilfred Noronha, the Supervisor of the Secondary Section, for his valuable assistance in the coordination of curricular and extra-curricular activities and academic issues. I am also grateful to Fr Leslie Rebello, S.J. for his help in the maintenance and finance department and to the Jesuit community for their moral support and encouragement. Finally, I give thanks to Almighty God, and pray that Mary our patroness and St Ignatius our founder continue to be our models and guiding light.

History from Memory

Dear St. Marian,

It is always a pleasure to keep in touch with St. Mary's alumni and this is one more occasion.

I would like to mention that this article depends a lot on memory because the article deals with the history of the Association.

A further point is to be made. In the School Certificate for Senior Cambridge, the certificate does not mention the subjects (history, mathematics, etc) if the candidate has not reached the minimum marks. It is

surprising that though I was extremely poor in mathematics and history, history was not mentioned in my School Certificate. So, for this article, I will be depending greatly on my memory. I could have found a lot of information from the Minute Book of the Managing Committee, but once when I had to hand over the post of Hon. Secretary to become the President in 1970, I do not know what happened to the Minute Book that was handed over. It is truly unfortunate that the Hon. Secretary did not do very much and much of the work of the Hon. Secretary was being done by me. At the next election I did not stand for election and reverted to the post of Hon. Secretary.

Now lets us go back to some history of the Association.

Much of what you read now is on hearsay. The Association had its start in 1903 and at some time The Aga Khan was a President for one year. How I do not know and whether this is at all true. The Aga Khan of that period was the Grand-Father of the present Aga Khan. After Independence in August 1947, the majority of Britishers and Anglo-Indians left for U.K. and some to Australia and other countries. There is a big blank after Independence as to whether there was still an association or every thing about it was missing.

Now let us start with the time that I entered St. Mary's.

I joined in January 1944 and was there till December 1954. During this time I would find 2, or perhaps 3, scholarships set up by St. Mary's Old Boys Association which were mentioned in the School Calendar. On the Annual Sports Day there would be a race for Old Boys. To my mind, other than these two features, there was nothing talked about an association for Old Boys': neither from the School authorities or the Staff . After 1954 I went into college. Later I got into insurance (1960)(Life 1st and then General Insurance).

During the early years I found myself quite free and it came to my mind to do something. I spoke to other Old Boys and asked them if they would support me if I took up the issue with the Principal. The Principal was then Fr. Adrian Dias S.J. who had taught me in the earlier years of my scholastic career. He was most enthusiastic about setting up an alumni association. (The School had been founded in 1859 to educate orphans but had no permanent address and came to settle at its present site in 1864).

I then realised that the School was to complete a Century at its present site and that was why Fr. Dias was so enthusiastic about starting an association.

I started in real earnest to bring in members who were willing to join for the very simple reason that the annual Ordinary membership was Rs. 5/- was to become a real problem which I will deal with later.

In 1964 the School was celebrating its Century. The Association organized a Dinner and Dance at Greens Hotel to celebrate the School's Century. (Greens Hotel was under the management of The Taj Mahal Hotel and was situated where the later The Taj Intercontinental now stands.) The attendance at the Dinner and Dance was reasonably good but it could have been better. However, all who attended were very happy.

The St. Mary's Old Boys Association was founded in mid-1962 and the First Annual Dinner(AD) was held at School in December 1962. The first full year of the Association was 1963 which saw the 2nd AD toward the end of the year.

I do not want to sound that I am bragging or have an oversized ego but I have attended all the 46 ADs so far. This kind of record is of no use to anybody except myself. Ordinarily, the ADs are held during late November or early December. However, a few years ago, several alumni who have settled abroad got in touch with Sushil Sukhwani, Hon. Secretary then, and requested that as many of them were to visit India and would be Mumbai around February the following year, could the AD for that year be postponed to sometime in February the next year? The request was put to the M.C. and the proposal was accepted. This year again, several overseas alumni got in touch with Sushil, now President, and made a similar request like the time before. The matter was discussed and the AD for this year has been postSSSSsponed to Friday, 13th March 2009.(Inshallah (God willing), I should be able to attend the AD and make a total of 47 ADs.

Around 1968-1970, the Principal was Fr. J. Molinet S.J. who took great interest in the affairs of the Association and attended as many of the M.C. meetings as he could. In the original Rules, the Principal was the ex-officio President of the Association to which he took objection. His point was that the Association was an elected body and it was not right for the Principal to be the ex-officio President and so he proposed that the Rules be changed so that an alumnus be the elected President and the Principal be an ex-Officio member of the M.C.. This was very well accepted and the Rules were changed as also the name of the Association was changed to St. Mary's Association. (It is unfortunate that Fr. Molinet requested that he be allowed to go back to Spain as he had not been keeping good health. The Society of Jesus accepted and he was allowed to return to Spain. Some years later it was reported that he had died of Cancer)

I have taken up the history of the Association from inception till quite recently and I may have not taken up some issues which the reader may feel that I have missed out on. However, it is quite possible that some other readers may have some other objection/s but I do not think that it possible to take up all issues. During these years, the Association had taken on some issue/s which I almost missed out on.

The Association had made, for the Old Boys, items such as cuff links, etc. and of course, a neck tie for the Association. The Association Tie was Navy Blue with a White band across the tie with the School Badge embroidered on the white band. I have made sure that the Tie that I have I wear to all the Association functions. Several of those who attend the ADs mix up the Association Tie with the School Tie. I make sure that I correct the misconception and make it very clear that the Tie I wear is the Association's Tie. Another interesting point associated with the Tie. The Tie was made with gold thread and was priced at Rs. 19/- and was sold to Old Boys at the same price with no element of profit.

I have made this issue quite extensive and shall continue from the time that the Association was registered as a Trust and the name once again changed. See you till the next issue.

"Teach him, if you can, how to laugh when he is sad ... Teach him there is no shame in committing mistakes, but teach him also that it is a sin not to own mistakes ... "

Teach him to stand for the right and fight hard if he thinks he's right.. "

"Treat him gently; but do not cuddle him because only the test of fire makes fine steel.

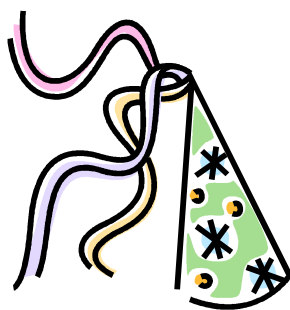
Let him have the courage to be impatient... let him have the patience to be brave.
